# NEHRU MEMORIAL MUSEUM AND LIBRARY 46<sup>th</sup> Annual Report 2011-12

he Nehru Memorial Museum and Library was established in 1966 as a society registered under the Registration of Societies Act of 1860. The aims and objectives of the Society are set out in its Memorandum of Association. The Nehru Memorial Museum and Library occupies a pre-eminent position in the world of scholarship and during the 46th year of its existence the Institution strived to improve the profile by undertaking a number of new initiatives.

The Nehru Memorial Museum and Library consists of a personalia Museum on the life and times of Jawaharlal Nehru; a Library which has a pre-eminent position among the social science libraries in the country; the Oral History; the Manuscripts; the Research and Publications Divisions; the Reprography Division; the Centre for Contemporary Studies; and a Planetarium in the name of Jawaharlal Nehru. In accordance with the objectives of the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library Society, the organisation places considerable emphasis on research and activities and on the extension of research facilities to scholars.

### **ORGANIZATION**

The Executive Council of the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library Society met three times during the year (11<sup>th</sup> October, 2011 and 11<sup>th</sup> January, and 19<sup>th</sup> March, 2012) and

Finance Committee met once in the year (11<sup>th</sup> October, 2011). The General Body met once during the year on 28<sup>th</sup> October, 2011. The names of the members of the Society, its Executive Council and Finance Committee are given in the Appendix.

A resume of the activities of the Society during the period, 1<sup>st</sup> April, 2011 to 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2012, is presented department-wise in the following paragraphs.

#### **MUSEUM**

The Museum, which is located in the main building of the Teen Murti House, the premier building of the complex, portrays the life and works of Jawaharlal Nehru against the background of the history of modern India, especially of our national freedom movement. It continued to maintain its popularity of previous years by attracting a large number of visitors every day.

During the period under report, 22,81,507 visitors hailing from different parts of India and abroad visited the Museum. This comes to an average of 7,431 people per day. On Sundays, the number went up to 8,474. Guides were available to conduct groups of visitors and interested individuals.

The Museum also had the privilege of receiving distinguished visitors from India and abroad. Some of them are: Mr. Eric Pickles, Secretary of State, Community and Local Government, United Kingdom; Dr. Mervin Silva, Minister of Public Relations and Public Affairs, Sri Lanka; Dr.

Afandizadeh, Deputy Minister of Road and Urban Development and Mr. Ali Akbar Safaei, General Director of Hormozgan Province, Ports and Maritime Authority from Islamic Republic of Iran; Mr. Guido Girardi, President of the Senate of Chile Republic along with their Ambassador to India, Mr. Cristian Barros; Ms. Shahana Khatun, Home Minister of the Government of the People's Republic of Bangaladesh and a group of Editors and Senior Journalists from Latin and Central American Countries.

Necessary help was provided to some News Channels for shooting in the Museum in connection with Jawaharlal Nehru's death and birth anniversaries. We also extended necessary help to some museology students from Ladakh who came through the National Museum Institute, National Museum, New Delhi.

Like every year, this year also, on the eve of Jawaharlal Nehru's 123rd Birth Anniversary, the Museum was florally decorated with the help of Delhi Ikebana International and Horticulture Division, C.P.W.D. We also received flowers from different states of India.

During the year general maintenance work was carried as in the past. Few damaged and faded prints and approximately 75 captions were replaced by new ones in the galleries on permanent display. The work of re-typing of catalogues of Museum displays was started. Apart from above, major works pertaining to maintenance, like cleaning of displayed objects and their showcases, personal collection of books kept in

different rooms, replacing of defective parts of jyotis, etc., were also attended to.

The Museum Souvenir Shop succeeded in selling Rs. 5,93,776/- worth of books, souvenirs, CDs and other items relating to children and Indian National Leaders during the year.

#### **LIBRARY**

The Library continues to occupy a pre-eminent position among social science libraries in India and abroad. During the period under review, it has made a steady progress. As in the previous years, more research material was acquired in the form of books, microforms, CD-ROMs, DVDs, periodicals and photographs.

During the year, 2,949 publications were added to its holdings. Out of these, 1,593 publications were purchased, 263 books as general gift, 194 books received as a special gift from Shri K.R. Narayanan, former President of India, (K. N. Collection) and three received on exchange basis. The remaining 896 publications were bound-volumes of journals, which were transferred by the Periodical Section of the Library.

Thus, with the addition of 2,949 publications during the year, the number of books in the Library has risen to 2,59,232.

The accession work of Shri K.R. Narayanan's book collection is in progress. During the period, 194 books have been accessioned. Thus, the number of books in this collection has risen to 3,875.

### Indirana

Three new additions were made in the 'Indirana' collection during this year. Thus, the total number of titles in this collection has risen from 353 to 356. #### **North-East Collection**

Emphasis is also being laid to add more books on North-East India. During the period under review, 16 new books on North-East have been added. In the acquisition of publications for the Library, due emphasis has been made to acquire books in Hindi. During the period under review, 451 books were added in Hindi language.

#### Microforms

No new addition has been made in the field of acquisition of research material on microform. The total number of microfilm rolls stand at 18,223 and microfiche collection at 51,322.

During the year, the Library has added 17 CD-ROMs, which include, among others, 'Future U.S. Space-launch Capabilities' by Franz Lojdahl; 'Songs from Kabul: The Spiritual Music of Ustad Amir Mohammad' by John Baily; 'India's Foreign Relations-2010 Documents' Ed. by Avtar Singh Bhasin; 'Crime in India: Accidental Deaths and Suicides In India, 2010'; 'New Oxford Companion to Economics in India, Volume I-II', Ed. by Kaushik Basu and A. The Library has also added 123 DVDs during the year. The collection of DVDs has risen to 564.

During the course of the year, 4,102 books were classified and catalogued and their data entries have been done in the computer according to Dewey Decimal classification scheme 21st edition and AACR-II. In addition, completion work and Bar-coding were carried out on 4,102 books. Also 18 CD-ROMs and 123 DVDs were processed.

During the period under review, Authors Catalogue, two volumes (January – December 2011) have been brought out in print form.

### **Journals**

During the period under review, two new journals have been added, and six journals which were received on subscription basis, have been discontinued owing to either they have been ceased/suspended or discontinued. On the other hand, on complimentary basis, no new journal was added but one journal was ceased. Therefore, the total number of journals being received in the Library are now 492. Out of these, 300 journals are published in India and 192 are foreign journals. While 439 journals are in English, 51 are in Hindi and the remaining 2 are in regional languages.

The titles of newly subscribed journals are *Defence Watch* (Dehradun) and *Social Change and Development* (Guwahati).

The total number of daily newspapers being received in the Library are 26. Out of these, 25 are being received on subscription and one on complimentary basis. While, 19 Newspapers are in English, 6 are in Hindi and one is in Urdu.

During the period under review, 4,305 new issues of journals were registered in the kardex, 92 bills of subscribed journals were processed manually and 284 journals/debates got bound. About 28,450 loose issues/bound volumes of journals were consulted by the scholars and restored on the shelves.

Five issues of back volumes of *New York Review of Books* (New York) volume 57, Nos. 1-5, 2010, were received from DELNET to complete our holding of periodicals.

1,852 issues of back volumes of periodicals have been computerized through Libsys software during the year.

### **Photographs**

During the period under review, 6,771 photographs

(General series and Special series) were added to the holding of the Photo Library and accessioned. Out of these 1,056 photographs are under General series, 4,368 photographs under IGMT Collection, 232 photographs under Mohammad Yunus series and 1,115 photographs under K.R. Narayanan series. Also 18 new albums have been added in K.R. Narayanan Collection.

Thus, with the addition of 6,771 photographs during the year, the number of photographs in the Photo Library has risen to 1,94,959.

### Postage Stamp

During the year, six postage stamps were added in the collection. These postage stamps were received as a gift from Philately Division, Department of Post, Dak Bhawan, New Delhi. The total number of postage stamps stands at 289.

Four hundred and nineteen research scholars, representatives of government departments, institutions and mass-media agencies visited the Photo Library and availed of its services. The Library had the privilege of receiving students and trainees. They are: A group of participants of training course in Book Publishing from National Book Trust, Nehru Bhawan, Vasant Kunj, New Delhi; a group of participants of one year Diploma Course in Archives and Records Management from National Archives of India, Janpath, New Delhi; a group of students of M.A. in Political Science, R.T.M. Nagpur University, Amravati Road, Nagpur; a group of students of M.A. in Political Science, Shivaji University, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur, Maharashtra; and a group of students of M.A. in History Co-operative Arts & Science College, Madayi, Kannur District, Kerala.

The Library continued to attract the academic community with its rich and varied resources in the field of social sciences complimented by the courteous, prompt and efficient services by the Library staff. During the period under

review, as many as 16,045 scholars visited the Library at an average of 54 scholars per day. In all 1,097 scholars were registered during the year, and an amount of Rs.6,26,648/- was realized from them as membership fee, etc. The number of books, journals and bound files of newspapers consulted during the year was 2,28,200 and that of microfilm rolls and microfiche plates 5,400 and 11,955 respectively. Besides, 410 microfilm rolls and 419 microfiche plates were handled for supplying photocopies of materials required by the scholars. The Library also dealt with 2,506 reference queries.

#### MANUSCRIPTS DIVISION

The Manuscripts Division acquires and preserves private papers of distinguished individuals and records of political and other non-official organizations, associations and societies that played a significant role in the development of modern India. These archival materials, which form the primary source of information for research, are made available to scholars.

During the period under review, the following papers were added to its archival holdings:

### Personal papers

### 1. Papers of B.R. Nanda (1917-2010) Former Director, NMML and Author

The third instalment of the papers of B.R.Nanda, comprising 110 files, has been received from his wife Smt.

Janak Nanda. The collection mainly contains his notes and material collected by him for writing books, e.g. *Road to Pakistan, Witness to Partition, Imperialism and Nationalism in India*, etc. The papers include material collected from various books on Indian history and from the private papers of M.A. Jinnah, Jawaharlal Nehru, B.G. Kher, Purshotamdas Thakurdas, etc. Besides, there are articles and notes on communal tension and partition of India by Rafiq Zakaria, Bimal Prasad, A.G. Noorani and others. B.R. Nanda's correspondence with Gandhi Peace Foundation, National Archives of India and some research scholars regarding his research work also form part of the collection. Apart from this, the collection also comprises miscellaneous press-clippings, and issues of the *Economist, Human Scape and India Quarterly*. The papers cover the period 1915-2005.

# 2. Papers of Shyama Charan Shukla (1925-2007) Former Chief Minister of Madhya Pradesh

The second instalment of the papers of Shyama Charan Shukla, comprising 20 files, has been donated by his wife Smt. Padmini Shukla. The papers contain correspondence of Shyama Charan Shukla as an ex-Chief Minister and Leader of the Opposition, Madhya Pradesh Vidhan Sabha, with Atal Bihari Vajpayee, Sonia Gandhi, Manmohan Singh, Digvijay Singh, S.Jaipal Reddy, H.K.L. Bhagat, Ram Naik and others. The subject files mainly relate to the agenda for the Congress Working Committee meeting (1992), Congress Working Committee elections (1997), corruption in petroleum sector of India, Sardar Sarovar Project, grievances of freedom fighters,

Mahakoshal Press, Raipur, etc. Besides, there are articles on Pandit Ravi Shankar Shukla by Pramod Brahmabhatt, Anil Verma and others. The collection also includes press-clippings on Shyama Charan Shukla's entry into Congress (I), diamond mining at Manipur – Deobhog areas, and tribute to Ravi Shankar Shukla. In addition, booklets such as *Indian National Congress (A Short History), Congress Ideology,* and *Pandit Ravi Shankar Shukla*, also form part of the collection. The papers, covering the period 1976-2007, are in English and Hindi.

# 3. Papers of A.C.N. Nambiar (1896-1986) Eminent Diplomat and Freedom Fighter

The third instalment of the papers of A.C.N. Nambiar, comprising one file, has been received from Shri V. Balachandran. This comprises xerox copies of letters from Jawaharlal Nehru, Indira Gandhi and Rajiv Gandhi as Prime Ministers of India to A.C.N. Nambiar. A.C.N. Nambiar's letters to V. Balachandran also form part of the collection. The papers cover the period 1948-62 and 1980-84.

### 4. Papers of Amit Jain (1983-Research Scholar

Dr. Amit Jain has donated the second instalment of his own papers, comprising one file. The papers contain xerox copies of C.K. Jain's correspondence with Narendra Modi, Atal Bihari Vajpayee, Rajnath Singh, L.M. Singhvi and others regarding the obstructions encountered by Jain pilgrims in offering prayers at the holy site of Girnarji and request for

maintaining sanctity of Girnarji Siddhakshetra, a Jain teerth in Junagarh. The collection also comprises xerox copies of S.S. Jain's correspondence with Mamata Banerjee, Manmohan Singh, P.Chidambaram and others relating to train accidents at various places. An article by Dr. Amit Jain entitled *Yuvaon ke Prerak* published in *Samyak*, and press-clippings, etc. also form part of the collection. Papers, covering the period 2007-2011, are in English and Hindi.

# 5. Papers of S.M. Mehdi Urdu Writer

The papers of S.M. Mehdi, consisting of two files, have been received from his granddaughter Ms. Taran Khan. The papers comprise correspondence exchanged by S.M. Mehdi with Kaifi Azmi, Ali Sardar Jafri, Majrooh Sultanpuri, Habib Tanvir, Mushfiq Khwaja and others relating to their literary activities in the Urdu Progressive Writers Movement and personal matters. The papers also comprise a notebook containing minutes of the Weekly Cell meetings of the *Qaumi Jung* and *Naya Zamana* held from August 1942 to December 1947. The papers covering the period 1942-2008, are in English and Urdu.

# 6. **Papers of Champalal Sokal** (1910-1995) Freedom Fighter and Gandhian

The papers of Champalal Sokal, consisting of one file, a register and a few photographs, have been donated by his daughter Ms. Sarala Sokal. The papers contain proceedings of

the Harda Tehsil Congress Committee, letters (post-cards) from Dadabhai Naik and Kashinath Trivedi to Champalal Sokal, a booklet entitled *Harda aur Swatantrata Sangram* and a few photographs. Papers, covering the period 1930-1989 (with gaps), are in Hindi.

# 7. Papers of P. Upendra (1936-2009) Former Union Minister and close Associate of N.T. Rama Rao

Two CDs relating to the life and time of P.Upendra have been donated by his son Capt. P.V.K. Mohan. These are in Telugu.

# **8. Papers of D.P. Yadav** (1937- ) Former Member of Parliament, Bihar

Shri D.P. Yadav has donated fifteen pamphlets mainly containing his speeches and articles on various subjects such as *Samajik Nyaya*, *Aarakshan aur Congress*, *Ikkisvien Sadi ka Bihar – ek Vishleshan* and *Kya Khoya – Kya Paya?*. Pamphlets, relating to the years 1976, 1989-2007, are in Hindi.

# 9. Papers of S.M. Krishnatry (1921-First Indian Trade Agent, Tibet

Shri S.M. Krishnatry has donated the second instalment, comprising one file, of his own papers. It contains a few data-collection of the Onges of Dugong Creck, and articles by him and by others on various aspects of the tribal people of Andaman and Nicobar Islands. Papers cover the period 1958-1976.

The papers of Kakasaheb Kalelker contain correspondence exchanged mainly with Jivanji D. Desai regarding Hindi Prachar Sabha and Navajivan Trust for the period 1946-50. These are in Gujarati.

# (ii) Papers of Maniben Patel (1903-1990) Daughter of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel and Freedom Fighter

The papers contain miscellaneous correspondence exchanged by Maniben Patel with various individuals and organizations, such as Kishorlal G. Mashruwala, Jivanji D. Desai and Mahadev Desai Memorial Trust regarding activities of Navajivan Trust, Ahmedabad. The papers, covering the period 1948-1992, are in Gujarati.

# (iii) Papers of Kishorlal G. Mashruwala (1890-1952) Gandhian, Journalist and Freedom Fighter

The papers of K.G. Mashruwala contain correspondence with Jivanji D. Desai regarding Hindustani Prachar Sabha. The papers, covering the period 1948-1950, are in Gujarati.

# (iv) Papers of K. K. Shastri (1905-2006) Educationist

The papers of K.K.Shastri mainly relate to Gujarat Sahitya Sabha. The papers also contain manuscript of a book by him entitled *Uttarkaleen Apbhransh ka Vikasand* a list of books available with him in his personal library. The papers, covering the period 1968-1982, are in Hindi and Gujarati.

# (v) Papers of Morarji Desai (1896-1995) Former Prime Minister of India

The papers of Morarji Desai comprise six letters exchanged with Anand T. Hingorani and Vishwas Kher, mainly relate to their personal matters. The papers, covering the period 1948-1982 (with gaps), are in English and Gujarati.

# (vi) Papers of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel (1875-1950) Former Deputy Prime Minister and Freedom Fighter

The small collection of Sardar Patel papers comprise a civil case relating to the role of Ahmedabad Municipality in maintaining education in primary schools. This relates to the period 1922-1923.

# (vii) Papers of S.L. Mehta Former Secretary, Government of Assam

The papers of S.L. Mehta contain his personal correspondence, manuscript of a book entitled *Karma*, and a certificate of merit awarded to him for the picture entitled

'Midnight Sun'.

# (viii) Papers of Ratilal Naranji Somani

The papers of Ratilal Naranji Somani consist of a diary relating to the year 1941.

# (ix) Papers of Hariprasad Desai

Close friend of M.K. Gandhi

The papers of Dr. Hariprasad Desai contain his daily diary and a notebook for the year 1946.

### (x) Papers of Mustafa Hasan B. Kadri

Former Member, Ahmedabad Municipality

The papers of Mustafa Hasan B. Kadri mainly relate to the affairs of Ahmedabad Municipality. The papers also contain annual budget report of the Seth Vadilal Sarabhai General Hospital and Seth Chinoy Prasuti Griha, Ahmedabad. The papers, covering the period 1919-1963, are in English and Gujarati.

### (xi) Miscellaneous papers

Dr. Rizwan Kadri has also donated a few miscellaneous papers relating to the activities of Mahadev Desai Memorial Trust Committee, and Navajivan Trust, Ahmedabad, etc. Papers, covering the period 1948-1999, are in English, Hindi and Gujarati.

### 11. Issues of Mahakaushal (Daily), Raipur

Issues of *Mahakaushal*, a famous Hindi newspaper of Raipur, have been received from Shri Kaushal Mishra in two bundles. These relate to the period 1976-1999.

### Other papers

In addition to the above mentioned papers, the Manuscripts Division also acquired from Shri A.K. Derashri a press-clipping article by Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru entitled *Exploitation of India*, published in *The Daily Herald* on 22 November 1933.

### Research and Reference

Many researchers continued to use our rich archival resources. During the period under review, the total number of scholars who were attended to in the Reading Room was 210. These scholars were recommended by their respective Universities/Institutions in India and abroad for consulting our archival holdings. 5,764 files from different collections were supplied to them for consultation. In addition, 51,730 pages were xeroxed for supplying to individual scholars as well as for official use.

### **Preservation Unit**

During the period under review, 2,067 sheets were given lamination treatment, 4,314 documents were given full pasting and 957 tissue pasting. Inter alia 5,510 sheets were washed to

remove patches and total of 1,333 documents were given minor repairs to enhance their durability. The Unit checked and collected 36,637 sheets of Oral History transcripts, documents of Manuscripts Division, papers of Administration, Research and Publications Division and Seminars held during the period and finally stapled 145 of them and bound 475 lists. Binding of 86 transcripts were also undertaken. In addition, 5,540 folders and sheets cut, 327 were gathered and stitched, 1,420 guards were removed, 564 books were guarded and 184 books were given full cloth binding for the Library. During this year, recasting of 572 books were undertaken by the Preservation Unit. The Unit also mounted 1,046 photos in the albums for the Photo Unit of the Library. Besides, parcel stitching and packing of 23 items were undertaken and 8 captions were also pasted. Fumigation of records was carried out meticulously and 1,078 files and books were fumigated during this period.

### REPROGRAPHY DIVISION

The Reprography Division is engaged in microfilming old and current newspapers, periodicals and archival records both in English and regional languages to preserve and augment research resources of the Library and make them available for consultation of the scholars. The Division also extends various Reprographic facilities to those scholars who visit our Library for research work.

During the period under review, the work of microfilming of the newspapers and private papers made substantial progress. In all, the Division prepared approximately 26,950 frames on 35 mm negative microfilm of the newspapers such as: *Business Standard* (daily), 3 July 2009 - 4 January 2010; *The Hindustan Times* (daily), 5 September 2007 -- 4 January 2008; *Times of India*, 1 January 2006 -- 28 April 2006; *Kirti* (Punjabi monthly), February 1927 -- August 1929 and September 1927 -- May 1930; *Kirti* (Urdu monthly), January -- July 1929 and September 1929 -- May 1930; *Kirti* (Punjabi weekly) 20 December 1933 -- 27 March 1936, 3 April -- December 1936 and January -- July 1929 (7 Rolls).

The microfilm rolls generated during the period under review have been accessioned after proper checking, editing and indexing.

During this period, approximately 1,28,811 xerox copies have been prepared for supply to the various divisions of our Organization.

The Division also prepared approximately 2,951 microform copies in different sizes for individual scholars, various institutions and also for the use of different sections of the Organization. The rewashing of old microfilm negatives and preparation of the second set of direct duplicate negatives also continued. During this period the unit also issued microfilm rolls for Digitization on regular basis.

### **ORAL HISTORY DIVISION**

The Oral History Division generates documents relating to the social and political development of modern India with special reference to our freedom struggle through interviews with distinguished individuals who have played a prominent role in public affairs.

During the period under review, interview of Capt. Abbas Ali was recorded in five sessions. This brings the total number of persons and sessions recorded so far to 1,329 and 5,347 respectively. Transcripts of six interviews comprising 930 pages were finalized. This brings the total number of finalized transcripts to 863.

A brief account of the interviews finalized during the year is given below:

# Krishna Chandra Johorey - (1927- ) Part-II Civil Servant (IFAS/IAS) from Uttar Pradesh

The transcript mainly deals with administrative issues pertaining to North-East Region of Manipur, Nagaland and Assam and also India's relations with Tibet, Bhutan and Nepal. Besides, he has spoken on expedition to Mount Kamet (1952) and Indo-French-Swiss expedition to Nun Kun (1953); birth of Indian Frontier Administrative Service (1953); Community Development Projects in North-East Region; Dr Verrier Elwin and tribal community; contribution of Jairamdas Doulatram as Governor of Assam; visits of Jawaharlal Nehru to Kohima (1953) and Tibet (1958); political asylum of Dalai Lama in India (1959); administration of Kameng Frontier Division; a detailed account of fall of Bomdila and Tawang during Chinese aggression (1962); Forward Policy of Jawaharlal Nehru; Lal Bahadur Shastri at Tashkent (1966); on Prince Palden Thondup

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Namgyal and Kazi Lhendup Dorji of Sikkim; distribution system under Delhi administration; raid in Okhla; on Emergency (1975-77); Delhi State Industrial Development Corporation; autonomy of bureaucrats; law and order situation in Delhi after assassination of Indira Gandhi (1984); functions of Chief Secretary; on Pratapsingh Rane, Chief Minister of Goa; Seventh Biennial Conference of the Commonwealth Heads of Governments (1983); Goan Christians; Indian Institute of Public Administration (IIPA); on Maharaj Kumar Priyobrato Singh and Raj Kumar Madhuryajit Singh; visit of Prime Minister Morarji Desai to Manipur; condition of Tihar Jail (Delhi) in the 1970s; contribution of Indian Civil Service; on Prime Ministers of India -- Indira Gandhi and Morarji Desai; Sam H.F.J. Manekshaw; reminiscences of Raghubir Sahai, Fani Badayuni, Josh Malihabadi, P. D. Tandon, Chaudhari Badan Singh and others.

## Devi Prasad (1921-2011)

Artist and Gandhian from Delhi

He has mainly recorded, among other things, the atmosphere of Dehradun in the 1930s; stay at Santiniketan; Quit India movement (1942); stay at Sevagram Ashram and Mahatma Gandhi; Nai Taleem; Gramdan and Bhoodan movement; War Resistance International; Jaipur Congress (1948); stay in London; Peace movement and anti-war ideology.

### Satyendra Sharat (1929-)

Writer, Journalist and Chief Producer (Drama), All India Radio, Delhi He has spoken, among other subjects, the atmosphere of Amravati and Nagpur in the 1930s, including political awakening, Hindi journalism and Hindu-Muslim relations; beginning of Hindi Films; student life in Allahabad; on Harivansh Rai Bachchan, Firaq Gorakhpuri and Raghupati Sahai; experiences in Bombay film world; and All India Radio and Vividh Bharati, Delhi.

### Wali Ram Jarnail (1901-)

Freedom Fighter from North-West Frontier Province (now in Pakistan)

His reminiscences include, among other points, political atmosphere of North-West Frontier Province in the 1920s; Khilafat movement; Khan Abdul Ghaffar Khan and Red Shirt movement; life in Kohat and Haripur jails; reminiscences of the visit of Jawaharlal Nehru to Bannu and Kohat.

### Manohar Lal Azad (1916-)

Freedom Fighter from Muzaffargarh (now in Pakistan)

He has mainly spoken, among other subjects, student life in Multan and Kurukshetra Gurukul Kangri; on Pandit Devraj; political awareness in Kot Addu, Multan and Lahore including factionalism in Congress, Hindu-Muslim relations, and role of *Shakti* newspaper; by-election of Shanno Devi (1940); Hyderabad Satyagraha (1939), role of Mahashay Krishan and *Pratap* (Daily), arrest and life in Aurangabad jail.

### Ram Lall Vohra (1912-)

Freedom Fighter from Lyallpur (now in Pakistan)

He has mainly recorded his reminiscences related to revolutionary activities in Lahore during the 1920s and 1930s. Also recorded, among other things, boycott of Simon Commission and death of Lala Lajpat Rai (1928); Saunders' murder and subsequent activities in D.A.V. College, Lahore; Bhagat Singh; Lahore Conspiracy Case (1929); on Hansraj Vohra; and Lahore Congress (1929).

During the period under review, the Unit has also sent the transcripts of Dr M. S. Rajalingam, Shri Hari Ram Arya and Shri V.P. Singh (Part-II) to the interviewees for vetting and approval.

Under the Modernization Project digitization of Oral History Archival material up to March 2011 are under process.

### RESEARCH AND PUBLICATIONS DIVISION

The work on the preparation of the *Selected Works of C. Rajagopalachari*, Volume-III (1923-25), progressed during this period. The typing and comparison work for all the years (1923-25) was completed. Research work for collecting information for the annotations of the material typed and compared, was also carried out during this period. The relevant subject and biographical notes were prepared with the material collected from the library and other sources and typing of these notes was also carried out. The work of annotating the rest of the material for this period is under progress.

Work on the subsequent volumes also progressed during this period. Selection of material for the year 1926-28 was completed. Typing of the documents for the year 1926-27 was also completed. Typing work of the documents for the year 1928 is under progress.

#### CENTRE FOR CONTEMPORARY STUDIES

The Centre for Contemporary Studies, in the Twenty Second year of its existence, has blossomed into a centre of advanced research activities. Under the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library's Fellowship Programme, our Research Fellows made notable progress in their respective research projects. Their names and titles of projects they have undertaken, are given below:

# NEHRU LEARNING CENTRE FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

With a vision to generate a basic awareness of, and familiarity with Jawaharlal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of India, the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library established the Nehru Learning Centre for Children and Youth (NLCCY). The Centre has about fifteen different programmes and activities for children, youth and teachers. It has also introduced Summer Open School during the summers.

During the year under review, the Centre had its participants from different states of India, including international participants from Pakistan and Bangladesh.

The Nehru Learning Centre for Children and Youth has moved into its new premises in September 2011 which was inaugurated on 5 August 2011. The Children's Library has also been shifted here. It has over 5,000 books, art and craft material and games for children. Library receives good number of visitors each day.

Besides, the regular programmes such as 'Living Gandhi', 'Rang Tarang', 'Museum tours -- Chacha Nehru Se Dosti', etc., the Nehru Learning Centre for Children and Youth, in association with NGOs, other organizations and resource people, developed a number of new programmes for children, youth and teachers. They are as follows:

# Museum Tours, Walks and other tours

The Museum tours 'Chacha Nehru Se Dosti', continued with much enthusiasm on a regular basis, catering to school children and special groups, often it was integrated with special programmes such as, art, treasure hunt and letter writing. Nature walk, estate tours were also conducted on a regular basis. Total number of tours conducted during the year was 216.

This year one more tour was introduced, i.e. Nature Beckons -- a walk through the wilds of Teen Murti, besides regular tours such as 'Cycle of Non-Violence' -- a cycle tour, covering Tees January Marg and Gyarah Murti besides Teen Murti Bhawan, and 'Afsana-e-Ashoka' -- a heritage tour to three Ashokan sites in Delhi.

On several occasions special exchange programmes and

interactive activities were taken up along with these tours. A special Independence Day tour was also conducted for students from India and other countries as a learning of shared heritage.

# Rang Tarang-Nehru Summer School

With six groups of children between the ages of 4 and 18, the third year of the Nehru Summer School was highly successful with deep engagement and festive atmosphere in which children learnt on themes like Soil and Water, Peace Leaders, *Letters From A Father To His Daughter, Glimpses of* 

World History and The Discovery of India. There were around 180 participants, with several children from varied abilities and special needs.

# **Summer Open School**

The theme of the Summer Open School, launched this year was North East India. It was a unique experiment offering children a flexible and yet very rich learning experience with regard to the different tribes, culture, nature and history of the region. Over 80 students participated in the Summer Open School.

In the month of July 2011, the NLCCY also conducted training of trainers and resource persons to organize the Nehru Summer School – North East Rang Tarang – for the organizations, the ANT and the PAJHRA, working with tribal communities in Assam. About 50 persons were trained. Besides, the NLCCY also assisted in monitoring the Summer Open School of PAJHRA at Golaghat and Kokrajhar

# Yuva Dhara – Nehru Internship programme

Strengthening our work with young people, we expanded to make this intensive six-week long internship for young people between the age group of 18 and 25, into a national programme. It was done in partnership with UNESCO and included two other museums (the National Rail Museum and the Crafts Museum). Thirty-two young people were divided into six groups and they worked on specific projects on museums, the Nehru Planetarium, etc. The programme was

very well received and offered scope for youth work.

# Kala Shala: Summer College

To commemorate the 150th year of the Birth Anniversary of Rabindranath Tagore, the NLCCY launched its first Summer College. Around 80 young people worked for a month using different medium, i.e., theatre, dance, visual arts and literature, to unravel the persona of *Thakur da* and deepen their understanding of his philosophy.

# Yuva Express and Weekend Theatre Club

To engage children and youth continuously over the year, the NLCCY organized a weekend programme. This involved various activities like films screening, interaction, discussions, skill share, theatre, workshop, etc.

# Living Gandhi

The annual programme, 'Living Gandhi', was a two-week long programme which included a wide range of activities in the campus especially around 30th January. Various groups participated in activities such as spinning charkha, theatre, interactions, etc.

# **Dosti Camps**

This year six camps under the title of 'Building the Nation' were organized from May to August, 2011 and the participants included the children from the interiors of rural India such as Bihar, Rajasthan (Kota), Madhya Pradesh (Nimach & Mandsaur), Lakshdweep and Assam. They belonged to the varied socio-economic backgrounds. The participants, during their stay in the camps, had an experience of participating in workshops, interactions, visits, home stays, outstation tours to Agra, etc. The total number of participants were 184.

# Yuva Yatra - Discovery of India camp

One North-East Discovery of India camp was held in Assam, May 2011, in collaboration with the ANT (Action Northeast Trust), an NGO working with communities in Bodoland tribal area of Assam and Nature Beckons, a nature

conservation group in Assam. The Yatra had about 25 participants from various states of India. The focus of the Yatra was to form a better understanding of North East India through exposure to rural lifestyles, livelihoods, interactions, field visits to wild life sanctuary, skill share, etc.

Five workshops for teachers on 'Museums -- as Learning Resources' were undertaken by the NLCCY during the year. Also a seminar on 'Building Community Involvement in Museums' was held in December 2011. The NLCCY staff also attended various seminars and training programmes held by the Ministry of Culture and in-house training.

#### NEHRU PLANETARIUM

The Nehru Planetarium, since its inception, has been playing a seminal role in disseminating knowledge about space and promoting education in astronomy.

During the period under review, 1,57,546 visitors purchased the Sky Theatre tickets and viewed the Planetarium shows. Of these 71,637 were school students visiting in special groups, seeing the Planetarium show at highly concessional rates. The Planetarium earned a total revenue of Rs.52,12,010.

# **New Planetarium Programme**

A new Planetarium programme on light pollution "Yeh Tara Woh Tara: An alert on Light Pollution" prepared entirely in-house by the Planetarium, was included as a part of the Sky Theater public shows. Implementing the visuals in a Full Dome

format, for a custom made programme of this kind, had cost the institution \$50,000 with an earlier programme, and the Planetarium is proud to have completed a project of this magnitude, completely in-house.

# Visit to the Planetarium by eminent personalities

# Student projects in Astronomy

Three undergraduate students, one amongst them is the Kishor Vygyanic Protsahan Yojana scholar, are completing a learning and analysis oriented project on radio pulsars, at the Planetarium. Four senior school students have just undertaken a learning and analysis based project on "Mathematics of Space: The Solar System" at the Planetarium.

A number of summer workshops and activities were conducted at the Planetarium such as 'Constellation Watch', 'Art and Astronomy', 'Moon Carnival', 'Assembling Telescopes', 'Matka Planetarium', etc. during May-June 2011.

The Planetarium and the Nehru Learning Centre for Children and Youth in collaboration with the Vigyan Prasar, Department of Science and Technology, organized an all night 'Lunar Eclipse Moon Carnival' at the front lawns of Teen Murti House, on 15 June 2011, from 8 pm to 4 am in the morning of 16 June 2011. Moon observations and activities consisting of discussions on 'Moon Science' and 'Crater Identification', also 'Moon Painting' and 'Moon Antakshari' were conducted. About 2,500 people of all age and walks of life attended the event.

The Planetarium conducted a half-day programme for invited school students, 17 August 2011. The NASA Dawn Spacecraft Mission was discussed in the sky theatre with Full Dome visuals. Following this a discussion, skype interaction session, was held with Dr. Vishnu Reddy, imaging scientist with the Dawn Spacecraft Mission. The Planetarium conducted its annual astronomy quiz contest for school students, 29 August 2011. About 140 students from 37 schools participated in the contest. Winners of the quiz were awarded with trophy and books. As a part of the celebration of Hindi Pakhwara by the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, the Planetarium organized a programme "Taramandal Ki Sair".

The Planetarium organized a half-day workshop for senior school students, celebrating the Birth Centenary of Noble Laureate Prof. Subramanyam Chandrasekhar. The half-day workshop had lectures on 'Noble Laureate Subramanyam Chandrasekhar: His Life and Works' by Prof. Panchapakesan, Prof. Patric K. Das Gupta and Dr. N. Rathnasree. Participants were also shown the Planetarium programme *Chandra: A Stellar Life* and a Full Dome presentation on *Series Painting and Landscapes* prepared in-house at the Planetarium.

The Planetarium staff conducted a workshop on "Sun Observations and Activities for the Transit of Venus" as a part of INSPIRE students camp, organized at the Bhaskaracharya College of Applied Sciences, Dwarka, 20 October 2011. The Planetarium conducted a Planetary Science and Astronomy session for students from Miranda House, Delhi University, 5 January 2012.

The Planetarium organized the release of a poster depicting conjectural restoration of the Jantar Mantar Observatory, Delhi, prepared by Design Route. Director General, Archaeological Survey of India, released the poster and Director, Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, presided over the release. The posters have been displayed as a part of the Jantar Mantar exhibit in the Planetarium exhibition area.

# Children's Fortnight

To commemorate the Birth Day of Jawaharlal Nehru, the Planetarium offered a fortnight (15 November to 30 November 2011) of astronomy experiences for school students and public. The Planetarium specially prepared a Full Dome Planetarium programme on "Nehru's vision of Space" for schools and public. The Planetarium also conducted different astronomy activities for the visitors during this period.

# Skywatch Activities

- The Planetarium organized a Night Sky Watch through telescope, for school students, on a request from Excelsior American School, Gurgaon, 28 April 2011.
- The Planetarium conducted Sky Watch through telescope for two groups of children attending residential group organized by Nehru Learning Centre for Children and Youth, 6 and 18 May 2011. One group was from Company High School, Distt. Rohtas, Bihar and the other from Dusra Dashak, an organization based at Buran, Rajasthan, 6 and 18 May 2011.
- The Planetarium in collaboration with the Amateur Astronomers Association, Delhi, conducted a Public Sky Watch to observe total Lunar Eclipse from Sunset to 10 pm, 10 December 2011. It was conducted from the front lawns of Teen Murti House. A power point presentation about Eclipse was also shown throughout

the observation. About 1,000 visitors came to observe the Eclipse.

#### **BUDGET AND ACCOUNTS**

During the year 2011-2012, Government of India, Ministry of Culture sanctioned an amount of Rs. 972 lakh as 'Non-Plan' grant for the payment of salaries and general maintenance of the Society and an amount of Rs. 523.58 lakh as 'Plan' grant for meeting expenditure on the approved developmental schemes.

Besides, miscellaneous and sundry receipts during the year stood at Rs. 95.91 lakh under 'Non-Plan' account.

The Society has also affiliated research fellows of various other educational/research institutions. For the payment of fellowships and contingency grants to these research fellows, separate grants aggregating to Rs.64.85 lakh have been received during the year. The break up is as follows:-

## PROGRESSIVE USE OF HINDI

The work relating to the implementation of the Official Language Policy in the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library is being looked after by the Assistant Director (Hindi). The Departmental Official Language Implementation Committee of the Organization is constituted under the Chairmanship of the Director.

During the period under review, the Hindi Unit organized four Hindi Workshops on 'Sangh ki Rajbhasha Niti Evam Hindi me Pattrachar', 'Sangh ki Rajbhasha Niti Evam Hamara Daittv', 'Sangh ki Rajbhasha Niti Evam Sarkari Pattrachar' and 'Computer Evam Hindi'. Also five meetings of the Official Language Implementation Committee were held on 8 April 2011, 9 and 30 August 2011, 30 December 2011 and 29 February 2012.

In compliance with the directions of the Department of Official Language, 'Hindi Samaroh' was organized from 15 September to 7 October 2011 in the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library. The Additional Secretary, Ministry of Culture, Shri Rakesh Garg inaugurated the function. During this period various competitions like Essay Writing, Noting/Drafting, Quiz, Translation, Poetry Recitation, Speeches, Sky-Show and Screening of Films were organized for the employees with the aim to promote and encourage the use of Hindi Official Language in day-to-day official work of the Institution. On 20 October 2011 a prize distribution function of 'Hindi Samaroh' was held in the Auditorium. The Director, Prof. Mahesh Rangarajan gave away 64 prizes to the winners.

# Accounting Policies and Notes to Accounts for the Financial Year Ended 31.03.2012

The Nehru Memorial Museum and Library (NMML) has been established on 01.04.1966 under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. The NMML is primarily a research institution and is engaged in the research work of high order in Social Sciences – particularly Modern Indian History. It is a non-profit earning, non-manufacturing body and is fully funded by the Ministry of Culture. The Accounts of the entity comprise of the accounts of the NMML Society and Modernization Projects.

## A. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# 1. Accounting Convention

The financial statements of the NMML have been drawn up on historical cost convention and have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountant of India an accrual basis unless otherwise stated.

## 2. Revenue Recognition

a) Income from sales of tickets and services are accounted for on receipt basis and is net of rebate and discount wherever applicable.

- b) Fee received for Library Membership are accounted for on cash basis;
- c) Income from royalty is accounted for on cash basis and based on the terms or relevant agreement and the statement received from the publishers;

# d) Income from investments -

- (I) Interest on interest bearing securities and fixed deposits is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and rate applicable.
- (ii) Interest pertaining to specific/ endowment fund is credited to the respective fund account.

## 3. Grants-in-aid

Government Grants for revenue are recognized as income on receipt basis and expenses actually paid out there from are shown as expenditure. Unutilized amount is treated as liability as at the end of year. Government Grants for acquisition of specific fixed assets are credited to Capital fund. Further the amount equivalent to depreciation for the year is transferred to Income & Expenditure account.

#### **Fund**

i) The word 'Fund' has been used to denote the

intention to keep the balances invested ultimately.

ii) Capital Fund represents the value of fixed assets created out of the grants-in-aid.

#### 4. Fixed Assets

Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less depreciation thereon except for non-depreciable assets.

# 5. Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on Written Down Value Method at the rates prescribed under the Income Tax Act, 1961.

#### 6. Investments

Investments are intended to be held till the maturity as per the management policies and are value at cost.

# 7. Inventories

Inventories of publications, raw microfilms are shown at cost.

# 8. Employees Benefits

Retirement benefits are comprised of General Provident Fund, Death-cum-Retirement Gratuity (DCRG), Pension and Leave Encashment as well as post retirement medical benefits and are paid/

accounted for on cash basis in accordance with the Central Government Rules.

### B. Notes To Accounts

There has been shortfall of investment of GP Fund and CP fund as on 31.3.2012 by Rs.53,61,552/- (Rs.47,22,647 as on 31.3.2011) as compared with the accumulated balance of GP fund and CP fund on that date. The shortfall is mainly on account of minimum interest payable as per the notification of the Central Government on the members' accumulated balance of fund and the interest earned on the investment held.

NMML has not claimed for reimbursement of the amount of shortfall for meeting the minimum interest payable to members of the fund from the granting authority till 31.3.2012 instead such deficit has been deducted from the Corpus Fund. The management is now considering to approach the granting authority for reimbursement of the accumulated deficit of Rs.53,61,552/- till 31.3.2012 so that shortfall in investment of GPF and CPF balance is recouped and investment pattern in respect of GPF/CPF is also followed as prescribed by the Government of India, Ministry of Finance, Notification No. F-5(53)/2002-ECB&PB dated 14.8.2008.

- 2) The provision for gratuity, pension and leave encashment is made on cash basis. The management is considering to get such liabilities ascertained as on 31.3.2012 based on the actuarial valuation from the actuary (i.e. Life Insurance Corporation of India or others) as per requirements of Accounting Standard-15, employee benefits and thereafter approach with the granting authority for additional sanction from Non-Plan General Fund so that mandatory accounting standard is complied with.
- 3) Interest on Modernization Fund investments has been recognized on cash basis.

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Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the accounts of Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, New Delhi for the year ended 31 March 2012.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Nehru Memorial Museum & Library as on 31 March 2012 and the Income and Expenditure Account/Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20 (1) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2013-14. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (C&AG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules and Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc, if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/Comptroller and Auditor General of India's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable

assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- (i) We have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
- (ii) The Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account/Receipts and Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the common format approved by the Ministry of Finance.
- (iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Nehru Memorial Museum & Library in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- (iv) We further report that:

### A. Balance Sheet

### A.1 Assets

### A.1.1 Investment of GPF/CPF-Rs.708.48 lakh

Investment of CPF/GPF balance was not as per the pattern of investment prescribed by the Government of India, Ministry of Finance vide notification No.F-5(53)/2002-ECB & PB dated 14.08.2008.

### B. Grants-in-Aid

Out of Rs 1364.80 lakh (Rs. 393.35 lakh under Plan and Rs. 971.45 lakh under Non-Plan) received during the year, Rs. 347.30 lakh (Rs.122.61 lakh under Plan and Rs. 224.69 under Non-Plan) was received in March 2012. The Nehru Memorial Museum & Library also had unspent grants totaling Rs. 175.20 lakh from the previous year and internal receipt totaling Rs.85.01 lakh. Out of the total funds available, Rs.1625.01 lakh the Nehru Memorial Museum & Library had utilized a sum of Rs. 1587.21 lakh (Rs. 523.43 and Rs. 1063.78 lakh under Non-Plan), leaving an unspent balance of Rs.37.80 lakh.

- C. Management Letter: Deficiencies which have not been including in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Nehru Memorial Museum & Library through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.
- v. Subject to our observation in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account/Receipts and Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and

according to the explanations given to us the said financial statements and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India.

Closing balance as on 31st March should be agreed with the opening balance as on 1st April. However, security of annual accounts for the year 2011-12 revealed, the following differences have been noticed.

The above differences in Closing and Opening balance needs reconciliation.

### 2. Overstatement of Income Rs. 7.94 lakh

CGHS contribution of Rs.7.92 lakh and recovery of License fee Rs.0.02 lakh was shown as income in the Income and Expenditure Account instead it is shown under the head remittance in the Receipt and Payment Account only. This has resulted in overstatement of Income and understatement of Excess of Expenditure over Income by Rs. 7.94 lakh.

### 3. Understatement of Expenditure (Depreciation) Rs. 360.39 Lakh

Depreciation (Net total at the year end – corresponding to (Schedule-8) should be shown as expenditure for the year in the Income and Expenditure account. However, Security of Income and Expenditure account for 2011-2012 revealed that zero effect of Depreciation amounting to Rs. 360.39 lakh has been shown on the expenditure side of the accounts and the same amount was reduced from the Capital Fund. (Schedule -1) of Balance Sheet as on 31st March 2012. This has resulted in understatement of both expenditure and Excess of Expenditure over Income by Rs. 360.39 Lakh.

### 4. Overstatement of Expenditure Rs. 7.92 Lakh

Payment of CGHS contribution of Rs.7.92 lakh was shown as expenditure in the Income and Expenditure Account instead of it is shown under the head remittance in the Receipts and Payments Account only. This has resulted in overstatement of both expenditure and Excess of expenditure over income by Rs. 7.92 lakh.

### 5. Non depiction of Account-wise closing balance

As per notes and instructions for compilation of Financial Statements of Non-Profit organizations and other similar Institutions (Schedule 11 – Current Assets Sl.No.4), Bank Balances with Schedule / Non Schedule Bank should be shown on Current Accounts, Deposits Accounts, (Including Merging Money) and on Savings Accounts. However, Bank

balances amounting to Rs. 643.80 lakh with State Bank of India has not been shown account wise in the Receipts and Payments Account and Balance Sheet.
